WAG Speaker Series






Time to submit to WAG's Bacopa Literary Review!

READINGS AT SAL'S AND PEACEFUL PATHS DONATIONS







Gainesville author **Art Crummer** announces the 2018 release of **“Floating Island:**

“In a sleepy North-Central Florida town, Paul Bradley’s life is adrift as disturbing rumors compel him onto his beloved Lake Lacuna. His canoe capsizes near an island. He struggles to shore and sleeps on a sand bar of a misty swamp. At dawn the nearby island is gone. Two weeks later his wife disappears. A fisherman finds blood-soaked parts of her shredded clothes floating in the tannic, gator-infested water.

Paul’s life is changing. Strange encounters. Under surveillance. Missing journals. Reality is an enigma. He survives a brain operation and must take charge of his life, stop drifting, make hard decisions, and start life anew. His boyhood pal from twenty years ago turns up to help. Things are looking up.

And then the phone rings.

This standalone novel follows the life of the boyhood hero of Crummer’s a coming-of-age novel **“Wrestling God,”** which combines a 1950s Huckleberry Finn with Holden Caulfield in the seemingly carefree hero Paul, who keeps a secret journal revealing his struggles with truth, sin, lies, and the unsettling behavior of his preacher-father whom Paul wishes dead, just days before it comes true.

Crummer is a past president of Writers Alliance of Gainesville (WritersAlliance.org), was published in the first edition of the literary magazine Bacopa, and twice selected in the Hippodrome’s monologue competitions. He was awarded the Edward Flemming, Jr. award in 2008.

Art holds a Ph.D. in mathematics, BS in Mechanical Engineering, and numerous blue ribbons from statewide music competitions. He gardens, raises chickens and gazes over Paynes Prairie contemplating the possible existence and nature of Time, the brain’s evolution, agency, karma, external redemption, and causality.”

WAG Member **Sandra Gail Lambert** is among 36 recipients in the country of the National Endowment for the Arts 2018 Creative Writing Fellows. Lambert, who will receive a \$25,000 fellowship, was selected from nearly 1,700 eligible applicants.

Gainesville resident Lambert writes fiction and a memoir that is often about the body and its relationship to the natural world, according to a release from Lambert.

Her memoir "A Certain Loneliness" will be published in 2018 by the University of Nebraska Press. Her debut novel is "The River's Memory" and her other writing has been published in The Southern Review, New Letters, Brevity, and the North American Review. She is the co-editor of Older Queer Voices: The Intimacy of Survival. Since 1967, the National Endowment for the Arts, or NEA, has awarded more than 3,400 Creative Writing Fellowships worth \$46 million. Many American recipients of the National Book Award, National Book Critics Circle Award, and Pulitzer Prize in Poetry and Fiction were recipients of NEA fellowships early in their careers.

This is a free E-mail Magazine that lists paid writing opportunities. You get regular e-mails about Web sites that pay for articles, blogs, etc. A couple of things to remember:

These are very competitive sites. Submit your best work.


The pay can be nominal. The advantage for the writer is they may get a byline, which helps their writing resume.



Submishmash Weekly – <https://www.submittable.com/>

Many of you may know that Submittable is the greatest thing that ever happened to author submissions. Many writers spent years manually printing, mailing and getting returns through the mail for their submissions. The process was slow, time-consuming and downright frustrating. Submittable made it possible to click a button and send your work out. Granted, many journals are starting to charge a small fee for submissions, but that's still cheaper in some cases than putting stamps on printed materials. *Submishmash Weekly* gives information about Submittable, about contests, articles, and calls for submission.

Their e-mails are timely and important. They cover a wide variety of styles and fields. For instance, two of their latest articles are, “Alternative [response templates](#) for editors and 15 [film-related opportunities](#) (Submittable).” A great service to sign up for...



Signing up with the Publishers Lunch mailing list doesn't automatically make you a member of Publishers Marketplace. To become a member of the Marketplace, you must complete our [registration form](#).

If you want daily access to new deal postings, or if you want to host a Marketplace page and thus be included in search and browse results, you need to [register for a paid Marketplace account](#). If you just want to search and browse our member pages and rights offerings, you don't need an account at all.”



Brushfire accepts submissions year-round. However, the cut-off date for submissions to be considered for the Fall edition is **October 14**, while the cut-off date for the Spring edition is **March 14**. For the sake of time, we only review art submitted through our website.

Though Brushfire is a student-run publication at the University of Nevada, Reno, we do accept and publish submissions from anyone, anywhere on earth. We accept any and all printable forms of art. But, we DO NOT offer monetary benefits for submissions. Instead, what we offer is the opportunity to have your work published in an award-winning, nationally recognized literature & arts journal. Brushfire allows for multiple submissions from the same artist, but we ask that you only submit original, unpublished work.

Other than the basic requirements outlined below, Brushfire DOES NOT follow any pre-established rules of evaluation in terms of deciding what does and does not go into the journal. We believe each new wave of submissions tells us its own collective story, weaves together its own themes, and pieces together its own mosaic of images. With this in mind, we only establish a criteria for review once we have seen all of the subject matter from which a criteria can be fairly formed. We are happy to provide you with more in-depth feedback about submissions upon request.

Here are some guidelines:

No previously published work.

Please submit only one piece at a time. Except for poetry. You can submit up to five poems. Everybody else — just one!

We pay \$50 to each contributor to our print issues, as well as two contributor copies.

So far, online contributors are paid primarily in karma. All contributors are also promised free beer, if we ever run into you in the flesh. If you don't believe us about the free beer, ask around a little bit. We are frequently tipsy and imprudently generous.

We accept simultaneous submissions, on the understanding that you'll tell us if you place the work elsewhere. It will probably take us two to three months to get back to you. We try to do that faster, but there are few of us and many of you.




